### 1. ICLEI Member News

#### Paris aims to recycle 50 percent of all waste



ICLEI Member Paris (France) has set an ambitious target of increasing recycling in the city from the current rate of 16 percent to 50 percent by 2020. To encourage the sorting of household waste, the city is launching a communication campaign that will include a dedicated website, stickers for bins, and 90 sorting ambassadors who will engage around 70,000 people across five arrondissements.

Recycling facilities will be enhanced, with more recycling bins for plastic, paper and glass to be distributed. New waste sorting stations will also be installed. In 2017, the door-to-door collection of organic waste will be trialled in two districts, with plans to roll it out across Paris if successful.

The programme is supported by [Eco-Emballages](#), a private company licensed by the state that aims to reduce the impact of packaging on the environment. The organisation is contributing €2.1 million to the project. At present, around 80 percent of waste in the French capital is incinerated while 4 percent goes to landfill.

#### Rome releases preliminary resilience assessment

The City of Rome (Italy) has published its preliminary resilience evaluation, which takes stock of the Italian capital's progress in ensuring resilience to climate change and looks at areas to focus on in the future. The report is based on the City Resilience Framework provided by [100 Resilient Cities](#). The preliminary evaluation has been carried out by the Resilience Work-Group of Rome, who solicited feedback from stakeholders and citizens through public events and questionnaires.



[The report](#) will feed into the development of the "Resilience Rome scenario", the city's official resilience strategy, which is due to be published in December 2016. The city has used the opportunity of the strategy redevelopment to promote a remapping of the city's issues and policies towards resilience.

The document concludes with an outline of the city's strengths and vulnerabilities. Based on the analysis, five priority areas have been identified: territory and connections; people and capacity; resources and human metabolism; systems, nets and heritage; and governance, participation and civic culture.

#### Dublin offers €100,000 in funding to increase number of people cycling



Those with innovative ideas of how to get more people cycling in the Irish capital can apply to win a grant of €100,000 to make their vision a reality. Launched by four Dublin local authorities and [Enterprise Ireland](#), the city is looking for smart, innovative, and low cost solutions to get Dubliners on their bikes. Named the Small Business Innovation Research Challenge (SBIR), [applications](#) are accepted until 3 May 2016.

Sarah Scannell, Cycling and Walking Promotion Officer with ICLEI Member Dublin City Council, said: "We want to increase cycling in Dublin, both across the Dublin Region and in the City Centre with a target for a quarter of all trips in the city centre to be taken by bike. Achieving this objective will require major investment in cycling infrastructure, increased promotion of cycling as an option, supportive policy decision making, and a step change in attitudes to cycling in our city.

"There are a number of short term improvements possible through the application of smart, low cost innovative technologies. The SBIR challenge will allow us to provide seed funding for companies and individuals to develop innovative and data driven proposals to accomplish this goal." The SBIR aims to use cycling data to improve understanding of cycling issues, enhance safety and reduce bicycle theft. Developers of ICT and software solutions, universities, and service providers are particularly encouraged to apply.

### 2. The Basque Declaration, the next milestone for urban sustainability in Europe

From 27-29 April 2016, local governments and experts across Europe will meet in the Basque Country at the [8th European Conference on Sustainable Cities & Towns](#) to discuss the pressing need for local action to transform our societies. Following the achievements of the Aalborg Charter (1994) and the Aalborg Commitments (2004), the Basque Declaration will be launched in 2016, outlining new sustainable pathways forward for our cities and towns.



Today more than ever before, the European Union is in a crisis. This crisis is not only a financial and economic crisis but a crisis about shared values, principles and goals that goes to the heart of the Union and raises questions about its future in a globalised world. At the same time Europe is asked to address global challenges like climate change and resource constraints. In this historic situation, European cities

and towns understand that there is an urgent need for a technological, socio-economic, and social-cultural transformation to create productive, sustainable and resilient cities for a liveable and inclusive Europe. Cities and towns' greatest resource to accelerate this transformation is support and exchange with one another.

### 3. European Commission publishes third edition of Buying Green! Handbook



The new edition of the Buying Green! Handbook, the European Commission's leading publication for assisting public sector entities to purchase goods and services that have a lower impact on the environment, has been published. The Handbook, now in its third edition, has been fully revised to detail the possibilities of how contracting bodies can put green public procurement (GPP) policies into practice under the 2014 Procurement Directives. Given the importance of public sector spending in Europe, GPP is an important tool to help achieve environmental policy goals relating to climate change, resource use and sustainable consumption and production.

Guidance is provided on how environmental considerations can be included at each stage of the procurement process within the revised EU legal framework, practical examples drawn from contracting authorities across EU Member States are presented, and sector specific GPP approaches for buildings, food and catering services, road transport vehicles and energy-using products are outlined.

The document has been written to also be of use to policy makers and companies responding to green tenders. The third edition of the Handbook has been compiled under contract between the European Commission and ICLEI – Local Governments for Sustainability, supported by Public Procurement Analysis (PPA).

### 4. FIESTA project provides informative tips on reducing energy use in family homes

The FIESTA project has produced [a series of animations](#) providing practical hints and tips on being more energy conscious. The five videos look at ways that families can reduce their energy bills. The FIESTA project works with a total of 14 municipalities across Italy, Spain, Croatia, Bulgaria, and Cyprus. The videos are screened during workshops carried out by the project aimed at primary and secondary schools, families living in social housing, and retailers and installers of heating and cooling devices.



A total of 46 workshops have been carried out so far. In addition to raising awareness, the project also conducts energy audits on family homes, outlining ways that energy savings can be made. Around 260 energy audits have been carried out to date across the five project countries, involving some 800 people. On average, the audits discover potential savings of up to 50 percent. Small changes such as switching off appliances fully, favouring energy-efficient lightbulbs, and insulating pipes and water heaters can result in substantial savings over time.

FIESTA is also carrying out a "save and win" lottery in each municipality, with ticket holders capable of winning energy efficient appliances, electric bicycles, efficient cooling systems and more. The first lottery took place in Pamplona (Spain) and saw two refrigerators and eight energy saving kits raffled off. The next one will take place in Trieste (Italy) on May 8th 2016 during the 17th Green Europe Marathon. Another focus area of the project is to set up a collective purchasing group in each municipality, enabling families to use their collective influence to purchase highly energy-efficient products directly from the manufacturer. The project is funded by the Intelligent Energy – Europe programme of the European Commission.

### 5. GPP 2020 project tenders save equivalent of more than nine oil tankers



The equivalent of more than 700,000 tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub> has been saved through the green procurement activities of the EU-funded GPP 2020 project. The environmental savings amount to 5000 barrels of crude oil, or the contents of over nine oil tankers. Over the course of three years, more than 100 low-carbon tenders were implemented by over 40 public authorities in over ten countries.

The project worked with public procurers in Europe to implement innovative, environmentally-friendly tenders. These impressive tenders were the basis for models that make it easier to purchase low-carbon goods and services. Any public authority in Europe can make use of these tender models. Examples range from the procurement of more energy-efficient commercial dishwashers in Germany, which saw the CO<sub>2</sub> equivalent of 207 flights from Barcelona to Ljubljana saved, to the joint procurement of an energy performance contract for Italian hospitals, which saved the astounding equivalent of the power generated by 341 football stadiums each year.

On 19 April, partners in the project presented the lessons learned and challenges faced through their GPP 2020 activities at the Low-Carbon Procurement in Practice workshop in Brussels (Belgium). The event provided a practical look at how the project's results were achieved, empowering other European procurers to make low-carbon procurement part of their daily purchasing decisions.

Purchasing tropical timber from sustainable sources can help to preserve some of the world's most important forests, creating a sound financial basis for sustainable forest management. The 2016 European Sustainable Tropical Timber Coalition (STTC) Conference, which takes place in Rotterdam (The Netherlands) on 23 June 2016, will bring together buyers and suppliers of sustainable tropical timber to share knowledge and best practice in the field.

Topics to be discussed include: How sustainably sourced tropical timber contributes to forest conservation; the impact of timber purchasing policies on both markets and forests; how best to design, implement, and satisfy timber purchasing policies in practice; what the [Sustainable Tropical Timber Coalition](#) can offer public and private sectors; EU policy and financial mechanisms relating to sustainably sourced timber; and more.
