ICLEI welcomes Hungarian city of Kaposvar as new member



Dedicated to creating a higher quality of life for citizens, the City of Kaposvar (Hungary) has recently become a full ICLEI member and will work with the organisation to achieve its ambitious sustainability goals.

The city intends to improve the efficiency of its resource usage, lower the city's energy use, and enhance public services; its impressive waste management scheme – which encourages high rates of recycling – is a testament to its vision. The city is also placing an emphasis on using alternative, clean sources of energy, with a strong desire to move towards energy independence.

Currently, citizens benefit from the city's district heating system, with biogas used for heating purposes. In the future, the city hopes to expand the use of biogas to power public buses. Through its actions, the city intends to grow its green economy and establish itself as an exemplary green city in Europe.

Geneva lowers public transport prices to reduce air pollution

To improve air quality, Geneva (Switzerland) is temporarily reducing public transport ticket prices, encouraging citizens to leave their cars at home. This was spurred after higher than normal levels of ozone were detected last month in Geneva's suburbs and city centre.

Without wanting to trigger panic, this pollutant represents a real risk to children, the elderly and those suffering rom respiratory problem; said Luc Barthasat, a cannonal official in Geneva. The measure is expected to cost 33 000 Swiss francs (€ 31,000) per day. Depending on its impact on air pollution, the measure may be extended.



Freiburg improves tram service



Six brand new trams have gone into operation in the German city of Freiburg, with six more to come in 2017. The trams are emblematic of the city's commitment to sustainable mobility and to providing a modern and accessible public transport service. The new trams will serve lines 3 and 5, which reach the south-west and north of the city.

TAP showcases local activities to help cities and regions access funding

A new video released by ICLEI outlines the <u>Transformative Actions Programme</u> (TAP), an initiative designed by local government networks and their partners to highlight and accelerate local climate action and to improve access to funding. Cities and regions are <u>invited to submit their most anothological</u> Cities and regions are <u>invited to submit their most anothological</u> inclusive climate action projects to TAP no later than 15 September 2015, which will then be promoted towards potential investors.



Collecting and showcasing up to 100 of the most ambitious climate projects. TAP Will make the important work cities are doing visible to relevant financial institutions (development agencies, funding bodies and banks, etc.), increasing the chance of securing funding. It will also scale-up the involvement of cities and regions in global climate financing mechanisms.

As well as bolstering the level of investment in climate action at the local level, TAP will help cities to design bankable projects, and work to lower the perception of risk some investors have regarding climate projects at sub-national level. Local governments will also be given support to measure their progress in reducing carbon emissions. The TAP was developed in response to the "Positive Agenda" promoted by the French government towards COP21

White House urges cities to join Compact of Mayors

US President Barack Obama has announced sweeping new actions on renewable energy and energy efficiency, and urged city mayors to publicly commit to measurable, reportable and verifiable climate action by joining the <u>Compact of</u>

Mayors



President Obama criticised opponents of the transition to renewable energy, and praised the solar panel industry, where jobs are being created 10 times faster tha in the rest of the economy. President Obama's comments build on the <u>speech</u> made <u>by German Chancellor Angela Merkel</u> at the Sixth Petersburg Climate Dialogue in May this year. At the Dialogue, Chancellor Merkel praised the Compact of Mayors for showing how "climate protection can be put into practice ocally'

The Compact of Mayors is a global coalition of mayors and city officials pledging to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and enhance resilience to climate change. The Compact of Mayors ties in with the <u>Local Government Climate Roadmap</u>, developed by ICLEI to enhance the visibility of local action in international processes.

4. ICLEI shares sustainable development advice at local government networking meeting

ICLEI provided information on funding opportunities and relevant awards for sustainable urban development at a networking meeting of local governments on 22 July in Mainz (Germany), outlining the benefits of the <u>European Green Capital</u> and <u>Green Leaf Awards</u>, and the <u>German Sustainability</u>. Award, ICLE has been working with the State of Rheinland-Pfalz to support sustainable development working wit since 1998



Attended by Rheinland-Pfalz Minister for Economics Eveline Lemke, the meeting presented an opportunity for local leaders to take stock of progress and plot a path towards greater sustainability. "Currently, Sustainable Development Goals are being discussed on the global stage. In Rheinland-Pfalz, sustainability is most tangible in our towns and cities. It is here, where models are being developed that aim to enhance quality of life, that we are most aware of the limits of our natural resources. If we want to protect our means of livelihood, sustainability is the only way," said Minister Lemke

ICLEI looks at the challenges faced by each local government individually, proposing a tailor made solution rather than rolling out a "one size fits all" approach. As a result, its consulting services are open to both advanced local governments and newcomers. Currently ICLEI works with large cities such as the German capital of Berlin, and smaller towns with populations as low as 4000.

The catering sector is a major contributor to greenhouse gas emissions in Europe. Conventional food production, processing, delivery and preparation processes are linked to heavy consumption of fossil fuels as well as significant soil and water pollution, proliferation of plastic and other non-organic waste, and local air pollution caused by transportation within cities. It is therefore not only the food itself but the systems by which it is packaged, prepared and delivered which need to be considered when reducing catering's carbon footprint.

By highlighting ideas and best practice cases from around Europe, the report provides ideas, inspiration and further resources for those who are involved in the procurement of food and catering services for schools.

Launch of new urban green infrastructure network

A new international network specialised in urban green infrastructure and bio-cultural diversity will provide a peer exchange platform for planners, practitioners and other experts in the field, particularly those working with local governments, to exchange knowledge with their counterparts across Europe. Participants also receive top-notch information related to boosting green urban grids. Those interested in joining the Learning Alliance can do so online.

The new network will be launched at the upcoming event primarily aimed at local governments, 'Green Infrastructure for and with Citizens: How can Local Governments Make it Happen?' which will focus on how to govern and maintain green infrastructure in cities in a participatory way. It will take place in Mundo B in Brussels (Belgium) on 13 October 2015.

The event is organised by ICLEI on behalf of GREEN SURGE, a European Commission funded project that links urban green spaces to the people around them. The project is producing evidence on how green spaces and biodiversity are interconnected with a host of issues crucial to local sustainable development: from housing costs and land use questions to public health and demographic changes.
