Culture and Cultural Heritage at ICLEI Europe

In recent years, culture and cultural heritage have emerged as central themes in discussions about sustainable development and climate change. Culture and our shared heritage can be seen as a powerful resource in the time of crisis, capable of driving forward debates on our common urban future.

A number of initiatives and actions on culture and sustainable development have been undertaken both at the international and the European level. ICLEI supports local governments in exploring new opportunities for fostering local/regional identity, integrating culture in climate change policies, developing place-specific civic economies, and involving diverse groups and their traditions in developing a shared vision of a sustainable city.



ICLEI Europe works to better support cities in linking their culture, climate and sustainability agendas through encouraging:

- Culture, creativity and place-based change. Culture, whether tangible or intangible, is central to what makes cities attractive, creative and sustainable. It plays a fundamental role fostering social and economic development through a new sense of belonging and heightened social cohesion.
- Cultural heritage as part of the transition to a circular city. This can be through the adaptive reuse of existing buildings and spaces plays a central role here by reducing raw material and energy consumption, as well as waste production.
- Resilience in cultural/historic areas which are increasingly at risk of environmental disasters, and planning for sustainable development by embedding their identity as well as the economic, social and environmental functionality.

Local Action Guide: Collaborative approaches to adaptive reuse of cultural heritage

The CLIC Guide offers an innovative perspective on adaptive reuse processes that encourage integration and social cohesion, as well as inclusive, circular, economically and ecologically sustainable design and implementation. Applying a circular approach to cultural heritage adaptive reuse projects not only reduces waste, raw material consumption and energy use, but it also reuses knowledge, preserves tangible and intangible heritage elements.

CLIC Pilot Local Action Plans: One Approach, Diverse Outcomes

A unique approach to address adaptive reuse of cultural heritage in a circular way was developed and tested as part of the CLIC project. The co- creation process resulted in a Local Action Plan for Adaptive Reuse of Cultural Heritage. The report firstly presents the Heritage Innovation Partnership / "Local Action Plan" development process in each CLIC pilot area, while the second part reflects on the HIP process and the considerations needed to optimise it as a replicable collaboration model for adaptive reuse of cultural heritage throughout Europe – and beyond.

Be.CULTOUR Action Plans for Sustainable Cultural Tourism

Six Pilot Heritage Sites located in Italy (Basilicata), Spain (Aragon), Cyprus (Larnaca), Sweden (Västra Götaland), Serbia (Vojvodina) and the cross-border region of North-East Romania and Moldova (Cross-Border region) established local Heritage Innovation Networks and co-created activities as the Be.CULTOUR Community of Practice.
